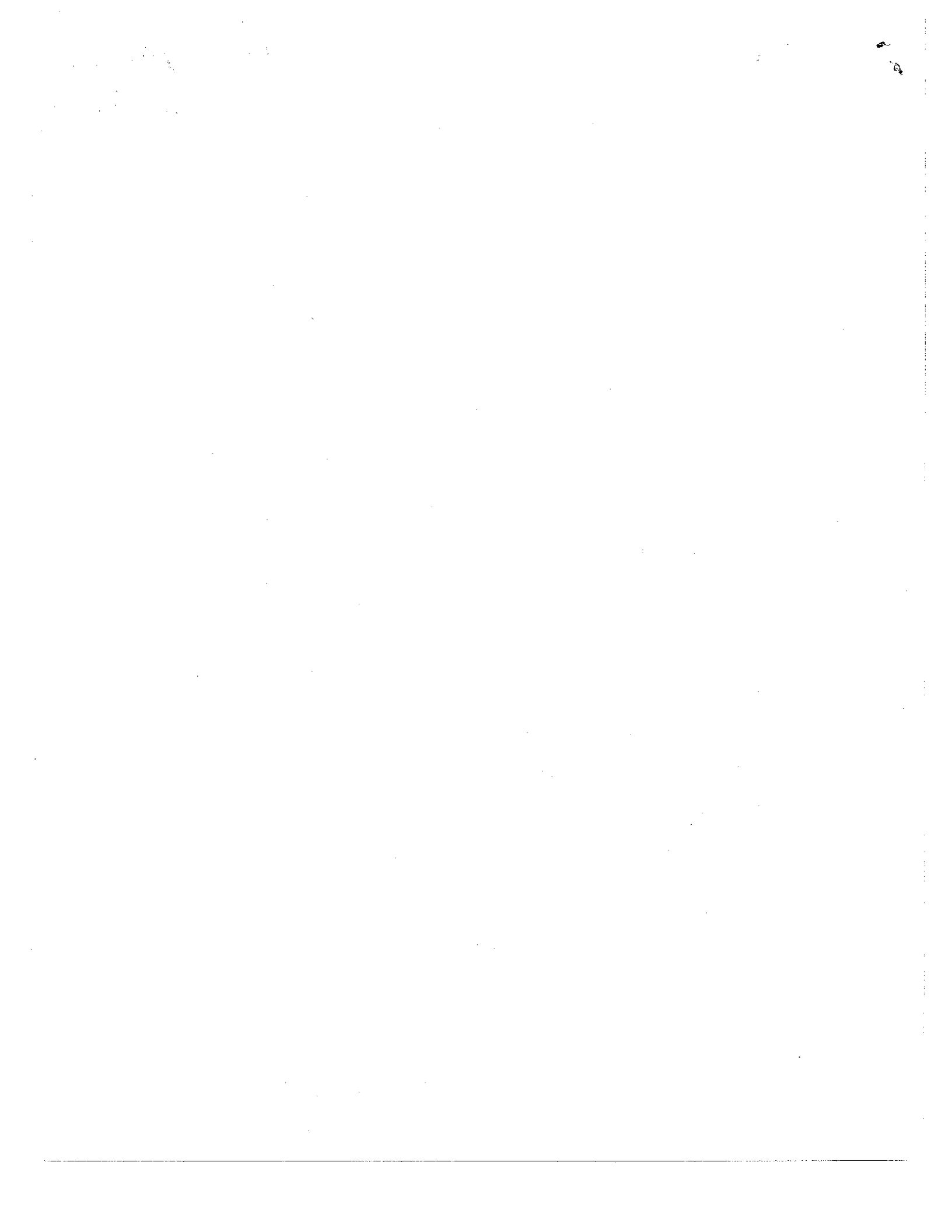
HOW THE MIGRANT AGRICULTURAL WORKER

Migrant Projects Approved
From July 1 - October 31, 1965

Fourteen migrant projects have been approved under Title III-B during this four month period involving grants of practically 10 million dollars. Ten are for, or include, adult education, five of them have remedial education for children including one which proposes through an intensive program to provide a full year's school program for 18,000 home based migrant children in a six month period. Four day care programs have been approved, some on a 12 month basis for young children of seasonal agricultural workers. Two self-help housing projects have been funded where technical and advisory assistance will supplement FHA loans for home base housing. In one of these a major sanitation project is included involving drainage, seepage pits, septic tanks and other basic improvements.
